Dr. Anikó Magasházi holds a PhD in economics from the Corvinus University of Budapest. She became involved in academic research following twenty years of business management experience in regional development and the financial sectors in Hungary and Austria. Since 2015, she has been a researcher at the Institute of Advanced Studies Kőszeg in Hungary, where she also manages the Institute's international relations. Her research interests include globaliza-



tion and regional development, in particular the impact of global value chains of transnational corporations on economic and social development in Southeast Asian and Central European countries. She lectures at conferences and university programmes as well as publishes and participates in research projects in both regions.

The development of Singapore first impressed her in 1982 when, coming from Central Europe, she trained there Asian student leaders at the international organization AIESEC. Having combined academic and business careers during her professional life, she remained curious about Singapore and Southeast Asia. This background motivated her to turn to Singaporean economic and social development over recent decades with a twofold approach. She aspired to reveal the secrets behind its successful macroeconomic governance as well as to study strategic responses of transnational corporations with changing configurations of global production and innovation networks.
