A harmonious balance between old and new, tradition and renewal, preserving and creating values. This is what this beautiful book showcases, among other themes; it reports on the achievements of a unique and great initiative – the Kőszeg Project based on the KRAFT programme – and envisages a promising continuation. It both reinforces as well as challenges our image of Kőszeg, a historical town that is often described with the fitting metaphor of a “jewellery box”.
